

DIACRITICAL MARKS

The diacritical characters available in current Indian fonts are not compatible with the font used by ARTIBUS ASIAE. We ask therefore, that you use the following signs to indicate characters with diacritical marks when submitting the final version of your electronic manuscript.

The system is simple. Instead of straight lines above vowels use the circumflex. Frame all the other characters with unusual diacritics within two asterisks ** and follow the code below. For example, instead of Śākyaṃuni, type *Se*âkyamuni.

The second letters in the abbreviations stand for the following:
e for égu, d for dot, dd for double-dot, dt for dot top.

As an alternative you may provide a separate list of all the words with diacritical marks in the form of a hardcopy. Here you should mark the diacritics by hand or use an Indic font.
